V. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

- A. Class 22 and Class 23 Liquor Licensing - Liquor Commissioner Gunter and Deputy Liquor Commissioner Mulhearn asked the committee to prepare possible questions regarding the moratorium. So far the Downtown Business District and the question of Video Cafes are two items of note. Possibilities moving forward are to stop allowing video gaming - we have enough or to eliminate video cafes. These are the decisions to be made as we work on an ordinance. Mayor asked that the committee review so we are prepared for the new year.

VI. NEW BUSINESS

A. Environmental Improvement Committee Presentation

1. EIC member Mr. Glenn Gabryel reviewed the year end report from the work of the EIC. DuPage County report states that Westmont has

underperformed our neighboring communities and the committee will be working towards reversing this trend.

- a) Trustee Barker stated that at the last meeting the discussion of recycling confusion of packaging, education, costs, and legislation.

- (1) Trustee Simonovich asked about educating the student population through the schools?

- (a) Trustee Barker said that is ongoing with Maercker & working towards more involvement with others.

- b) Manager May stated the yard waste activity could be a result of people being home more.

- c) Contaminated recycling is the major problem. Legislation to have a coherent list across the state would help, Metropolitan Mayors Caucus is working on promoting this legislation.

B. Burlington Parking - Manager May discussed the parking meters on Burlington and the proposal that we remove the meters. The reason we have meters are the BNSF/Metra prefers that there are nonpermit available spaces for riders.

- 1. Mayor asked what the time limit would be for the spaces if the meters are removed?

- a) Manager May said that free untimed parking will be the commuters in Downers Grove will just start parking there instead of paying the commuter pass in Downers Grove. Best to leave it 4 hour parking.

- b) Deputy Chief Gruen discussed the parking survey the police department performed for the last few weeks. There have been few parking spots used, the meter parking has not generated revenue over \$300.00 annually.

- c) Trustee Simonovich asked what the people that need daily parking and not a monthly pass should do?

- (1) Manager May responded that we allow daily parking after 9:00 a.m. in any lot.

- d) Trustee Liddle asked if a parking app was a possibility?

- (1) Deputy Chief Gruen stated that the app was a possibility.

- (2) Manager May replied that we would look into that, near

the guard rail.

- e) Trustee Liddle remarked that the ridership will be going up now.
- f) Trustee Simonovich asked that the app be considered.
- g) Trustee Liddle asked about the Lincoln parking lot moving forward.

(1) Manager May discussed the business parking downtown for employees of downtown employers and 4 hours for business customers.

C. Village Flag - The Village has been contacted by a local business and has asked to purchase 3 Westmont Flags. Do we want to be in the business of marketing our flag? Do we want to allow our flag to be flown at other places? We can mandate a flag pole, but not what is flown on it.

- 1. Trustee Nero believes that it is a great idea to promote Westmont.
- 2. Trustee Simonovich believes that it is bizarre for our flag to be flown outside of Westmont.
- 3. Manager May stated we could have it only available to Westmont businesses.
 - a) Trustee Simonovich likes that idea better, she doesn't understand why a business wants this.
- 4. Manager May asked WCCTB Executive Director Forssberg if he knew who the business in question was, and why they wanted 3 flags?
 - a) Director Forssberg stated it was not a face to face request, rather a phone call to his office staff. He would look into it.
- 5. Manager May asked if we could tie purchase to Chamber membership.
 - a) Director Forssberg replied that the desire to fly a Westmont Flag should be encouraged.
 - b) Discussion of flags ensued, the Committee agreeing to allow the sale of the 3 flags.

 - The new Utility Billing system is live and customers are making payments in the new system. Some customers have requested and received assistance setting up accounts, but the call volume has been manageable.
 - Some residents have been able to make use of the County's LIHWAP program for water bill assistance, and we have received funds from the county from the program.
 - Since the last meeting, three additional customers have asked that I pass on to you their feedback about the Waste Management contract and asked to be added to the list of people to be contacted next time the Waste Management contract is discussed at a public meeting. Two individuals expressed frustration with the exclusivity requirement in the contract and one expressed frustration that even vacant houses have to pay for garbage whether they use it or not.
- Staffing
 - The Village Finance Director posting will close this Friday. As of Tuesday evening we had received 20 applications for the Finance Director position, with the recruiter noting that some were very strong candidates and indicating that this is a better showing than they are seeing for other similar positions. In looking at the applicants they said the Westmont's location seems to be a key factor.
 - With Natasha's promotion to Business Office Supervisor, we have been working to fill that position and have received a handful of applications. We had a new temporary employee assisting in this position this past month.

 - This a reminder that the Budget Workshop is scheduled for April 14, 2022. We will discuss the time at the committee meeting, but we are tentatively considering starting at 4:30, the time committee meetings start.

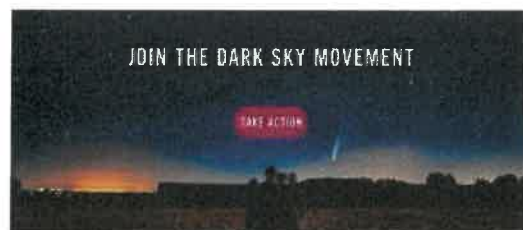

Executive summary 2020-21 :

The extraordinary conditions presented by the onset of Covid-19 shut-down in mid-Q1 2020 presented significant challenges against the original plans and goals of the EIC. These continued Q1 of 2021. Key events in '20 including the TCF River Sweep, storm drain stenciling, plant sales and Pumpkin Smashing were cancelled. Fortunately they resumed in '21. Action items achieved:

- **Waste stream minimization**

Diverted at least 12.4 tons (5.6 in 2020, 6.8 in 2021) of material from landfill or other disposal. This includes the 2021 initiation with Waste Management of a residential curbside compost collection program.

- **Community outreach & events**

In 2020, the EIC represented the VOW at Maerker School dist. 60 science fair and in 2021 hosted a tent at a Crusin' Nights and a table at the Public Works open house. Both focused on the new composting collection program.

- **Professional engagement & knowledge acquisition**

EIC members represented the Village at the 2020-21 DuPage / TCF environmental summits. Approx. 26 communities and organizations were present for the subject "Is Climate Change Impacting DuPage County?"

Spent some 60 hours, primarily via teleconference, at seminars, Mayors Metropolitan Caucus and other meetings representing the VOW and to acquire knowledge for fact based decision making.

- **Resolutions / recommendations / policy evaluations**

2020 - a recommendation to the Board was made that the Village should promote and facilitate residential and commercial solar permitting.

The EIC worked with Communications to establish a 'solar landing page' on the Green Page site, which supported achievement for a Westmont 'bronze' SolSmart certification.

2021 – the EIC submitted a resolution in April '21 for a "No Mow" initiative. This was approved by the Board, 161 residents signed up in 2021.

The EIC continues to collect information to support and promote 'dark skies' policies, for new commercial and Village construction and to assist residential properties in best practices.

Summary comments on waste & recycling tables and charts:

VOW curbside disposal data – being responsible for what we discard

Due to the mandated shut-down and work at home requirements, calendar years 2020-21 can be considered comparatively anomalous. Although there are 2 years of data available under those conditions, conclusions cannot be fully determined.

Even discounting for the expected increase in residential disposal, Westmont's 2020-21 disposal tonnage data continued some general trends observed in prior years. A comparison table by category on our 2018-21 disposal tonnage is provided on page 4.

- On an annual basis, unfortunately Westmont's recycling v. refuse recovery rate remains on an unfavorable, if slightly flatter, trend. Excluding yard waste, the 2021 garbage tonnage component actually *declined* 4.1% from 2020. It constituted 77% of disposal in 2021, a *ratio increase* of 2.2%. Unfortunately recycling tonnage also declined, fully 14.1% under prior year and -2.5% of the total.

Note- these observations are based on raw tonnage, not volume. Shifts in the recycled materials mix can significantly affect the data (ie. potentially more plastics and paper, thereby less tonnage).

- Yard waste is not formally a reporting factor under the assumption that it is prohibited from landfills and is sensitive to seasonal weather. However for reference in 2021 this category was 17.4% of total collected tons, a large increase of 75.4% from prior year. No definite explanation can be offered for this increase as some public outdoor activities resumed in 2021 and the only program change was adding composting which had too few subscribers to alter the weight.

A graph for 4 years of Westmont data for all categories with moving average trend line is plotted on page 5. It illustrates the expected seasonality impact especially for trash and yard waste. Recycling appears to be mainly peaked Q2 then declining until the cycle repeats similar to last year.

The data is repeated on page 6 except here the trend line is linear. This clearly plots the uptrend for garbage and yard waste tonnage over time while the line for recycling continues to reflect the down / flat trend indicated by the numerical data.

Westmont v. DuPage County - 'Cool DuPage' report

On a peer community basis, referring to the DuPage County 2021 'Annual Waste & Recycling Report' under "Cool DuPage", the 28 reporting communities are published in alphabetical order, and the 'recycling rate' considers aggregate tonnage of all 3 types of material – waste, recyclables and landscape.

Westmont's comparative ranking in 2021 performance as reported by the County is shown on page 7 ("DuPage Data Ranked"). The left hand side chart ranks the recycling rate of the communities in descending percentage order instead of the county's alpha order. As calculated by the county, the rate includes landscape tonnage. Here Westmont ranks 8 of 28 in recycling rate.

From preceding EIC presentations though, we know that the amount of landscape tonnage varies considerably by community. How much landscape that each generates can, in our opinion, distort the aggregate recycling percentage and is anyway an irrelevant datum since by law landscape is

prohibited from municipal landfills. Therefore the chart on page 9 has the ranking based only on a rate of refuse and recycled tonnage. By this method Westmont ranked lower, to 20 of 28. This position is less favorable from prior year when our Village was 13 of 25.

- From the DuPage report, using the EIC methodology we underperformed in comparison to our peer communities of Clarendon Hills, Darien and Downers Grove.

Notes:

1) In 2020 the County report recorded only 25 communities, down from 26 in 2019. In 2021, 28 communities reported. Unless borders were shifted I assume more communities had resources to tender data. If this is a concern, inquiries can be made with Cool DuPage.

2) The rankings are by tonnage only; there is no weighing for population, area or other demographics. Compensating for factors like the percentage of single family v. multi-unit would have to be considered and that could get complicated. It would require a separate study and the relevance is unclear as regardless, each community is responsible for maximizing its own recovery rate irrespective of income level and other factors.

Tailwinds:

Early in 2020 Waste Management warned of increased overall waste tonnage. The EIC expected that Covid-19 restrictions would have a negative impact on recycling over the year and continuing into 2021.

While Village population is relatively stable, garbage tonnage keeps going up, if down in 2021. Additional community information and other measures are necessary to reduce the increasing amount of trash being collected at curbside recycling.

Against our neighbors, despite some unknown details in the DuPage 2020 report, it serves as a useful benchmark to determine just how much recycling changed locally during 2021.

Headwinds:

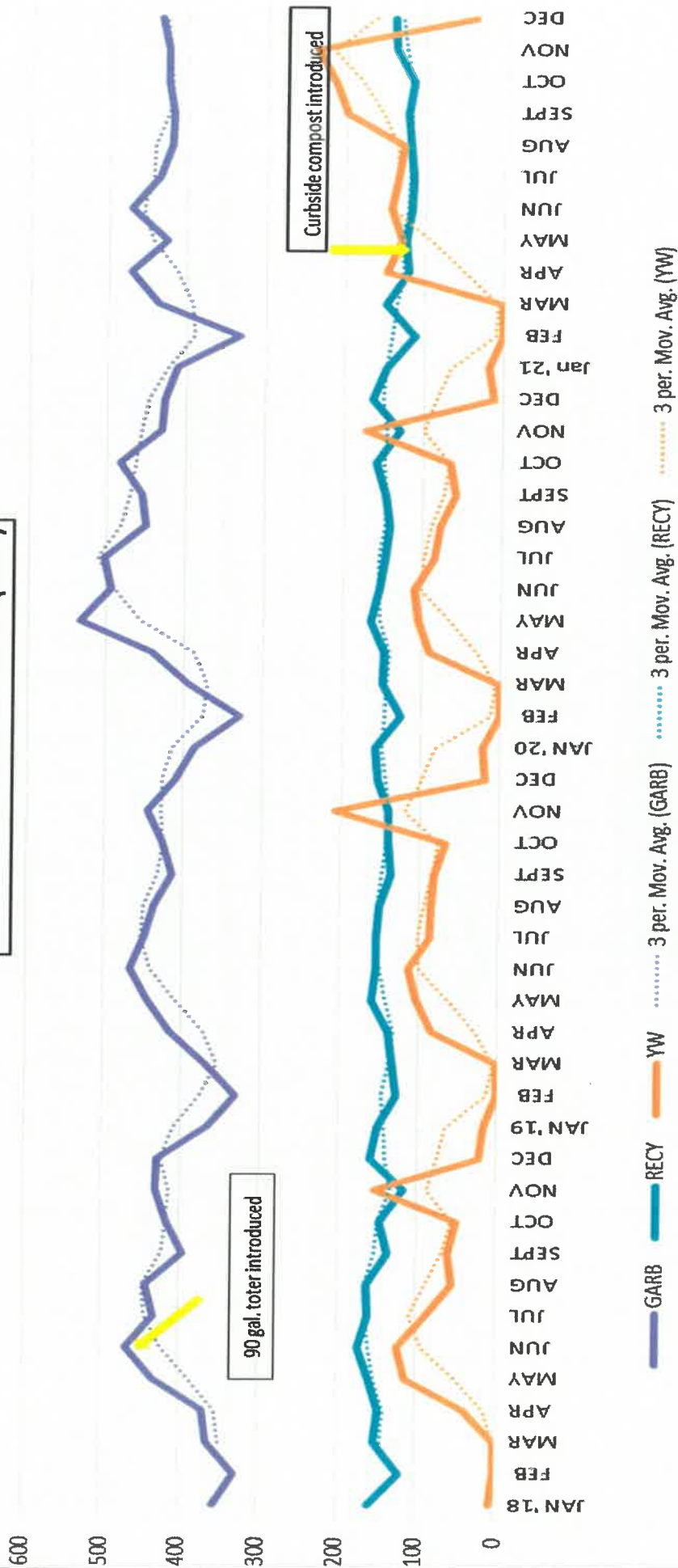
WM implemented the curbside composting program in 2021 as originally developed with the EIC and approved by the Board. Over time, in conjunction with informational campaigns for on-site composting this should have a positive effect of lowering garbage tons and increasing yard waste (compost goes to dedicated sites, not landfill).

The seasonal collections (holiday trees, lights and pumpkins) continue to have community support, with important diversion effects.

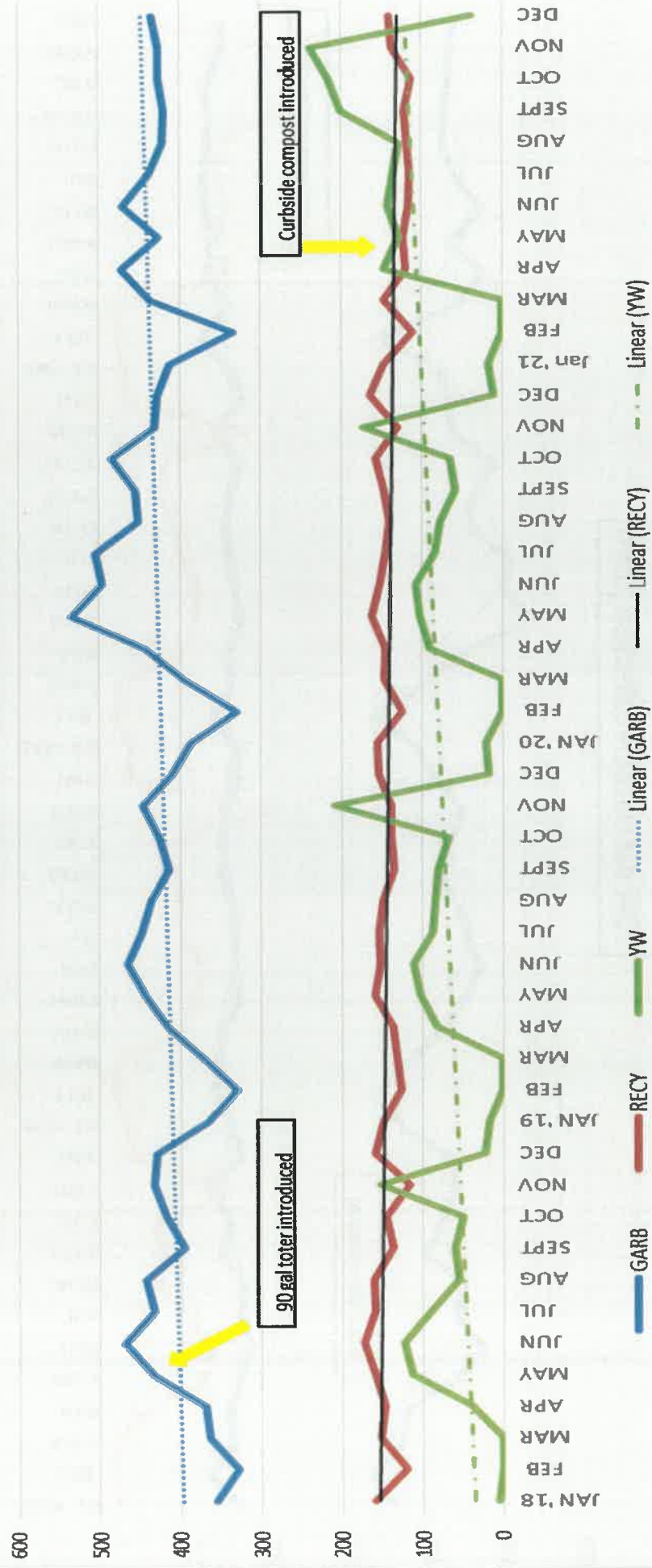
The EIC plans be able to offer residents at least 1 special drop-off event in 2022. The collection could include scrap metal, wood and other materials and should further depress the garbage tonnage.
